## 1. INTRODUCTION

### 1.1. Background

The SUN Movement Secretariat has been built out of the High Level Task Force on Global Food Security (HLTF) Coordination Team, itself set up on the basis of the administrative arrangements of the UN System Influenza Coordination (UNSIC - initiated in 2005).

The initial estimate of the Budget for staffing and activities of the SUN Movement Secretariat for 2013-2015 was prepared in 2012 following the decision (on the basis of the 2011 SUN Movement stewardship study) to set up a secretariat that would support the SUN Movement for the period 2013-2015.

#### ***Scaling Up Nutrition Movement Strategy 2012 2015<sup>1</sup>:***

*“26. The Lead Group and the Networks are coordinated and supported by the SUN Movement Secretariat (SMS). The SMS is accountable to the Lead group, the SUN countries and the SUN Networks. The SMS – supported by dedicated task teams drawn from the Movement’s membership – encourages best practice on (a) prioritising effective actions to improve nutrition, (b) monitoring and validating progress, (c) advocacy and communications throughout and beyond the Movement, (d) tracking of resources for nutrition and (e) avoidance of conflicts of interest. It ensures that the Movement’s progress is both tracked efficiently and communicated clearly. The SMS ensures that a SUN website features activities undertaken within the Movement.”*

### 1.2. Foundation of the SUN Movement Secretariat (December 2012) and July 2013 Update

The SUN Movement Secretariat has been set up as a small and flexible coordination and supporting team connected to the SUN countries and the SUN Networks, encouraging the effective functioning and coherence of the Movement. It is headed by the SUN Movement Coordinator and serves the SUN Lead Group and his Chair in exercising its responsibility for the stewardship of the Movement.

The structure of the SUN Movement Secretariat was established using information available in 2012 regarding the evolution of the Movement and the expectations of its stakeholders. The “foundation document” is the “Description of the Action” (i.e. Action Fiche) developed during second half of 2012 for

the European Commission at the occasion of the negotiation of its support to the SUN Movement Secretariat. The present report is an update of the “foundation document”.<sup>2</sup>

A review of progress in July 2013 indicates that: (1) the pace of growth of the Movement has been rapid: 32 countries in December 2012 – 41 countries in July 2013 and more countries are likely to join the Movement in coming months; (2) the stakeholders of the Movement have made important progress and had important interactions at series of high level meetings at global, regional and local level which have been supported – to some extent – by the SUN Movement Secretariat.

The capacities of the SUN Movement Secretariat have supported this important evolution of the Movement in the first half of 2013. The design and operation of the SUN Movement Secretariat has made it adaptable to a rapidly changing environment (short-term) with important uncertainties (mid-term): it has been able to respond efficiently to these changes.

**The July 2013 Update gives the opportunity to revise the structure and functioning of the SUN Movement Secretariat, while maintaining its basic design as established in 2012:**

- **small and flexible team functioning against an unchanged description of activities tailored to serve the SUN Countries, Networks and Lead Group and ensuring the Monitoring and Evaluation of the SUN Movement;**
- **light internal administrative capacities supported by UNOPS and UNDP;**
- **housed by UNOG in Geneva (villa la Pelouse) and UNDP in New York (DC2).**

**The July 2013 Update highlights an increase in provisional budget (compared to provision made in December 2012) of 14% reflecting a slight growth in size and capacities of the SUN Movement Secretariat to adapt to evolving needs and expectations (see chapter 3 of present report). It is to be noted that the current foundation of the SUN Movement Secretariat is not designed to support a drastic change (in size, activities, expected outputs and outcomes).**

## 2. ACCOUNTABILITY AND EXPECTED EVOLUTION OF THE SUN MOVEMENT SECRETARIAT

### 2.1. Monitoring and Evaluation Framework for the SUN Movement

The Stewardship plan for the SUN Movement called for the Lead Group to establish an appropriate mechanism of continuous monitoring and independent evaluation to ensure accountability. The SUN Movement Strategy sets out what the Movement aims to achieve over the period of the Strategy and how these objectives are to be achieved. The SUN Movement Secretariat, on behalf of the SUN Lead Group, conducted a process to develop a Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) Framework<sup>3</sup> for the SUN Movement which was approved by the SUN Lead Group at their meeting on April 10, 2013.

Over the first quarter of 2013, the Secretariat worked with two monitoring and evaluation experts (MDF Training & Consultancy) to develop a M&E Framework for the SUN Movement. The M&E Framework will be used to measure the progress and effectiveness of the SUN Movement over the next three years (2013-2015). The Framework has three linked parts which monitor – *impact, outcome and output* – each with a distinct purpose.

- Monitoring the impact of efforts to Scale Up Nutrition within SUN countries: This section aims to measure changes in the nutritional status of mothers and children based on the collection and aggregation of third party data on undernutrition. The work on measuring impact currently being undertaken by the Donor Network, and led by the European Commission, will be of particular use in relation to this section.
- Monitoring the outcomes of efforts to Scale Up Nutrition as practiced by different stakeholders within the SUN Movement: This part of the M&E Framework is the core of the document. It reinforces mutual accountability by measuring the behaviour of SUN stakeholders (countries, Networks) against a set of key processes in support of scaling up nutrition.
- Monitoring the services (outputs) provided by the SUN Movement Secretariat and assessing their contribution to the SUN Movement: This part involves monitoring and reporting by the Secretariat on the contribution of its services to the ways in which different parts of the SUN Movement are functioning.

All SUN Networks have a responsibility to report on progress within their Networks against the M&E Framework to the SUN Secretariat on an annual basis for inclusion in the Annual Progress Report. The SUN Movement Secretariat will track progress in the SUN countries and against its own progress markers and will be responsible for aggregating the information received from the SUN Networks.

The Secretariat also developed a baseline survey (with expert support) using the M&E Framework. This baseline captures the situation of the Movement at the time the SUN Movement Strategy and the revised SUN Road Map were approved in September 2012 and represents the point of comparison for future monitoring and evaluation, including the independent evaluation of the SUN Movement and Secretariat foreseen in 2015. The baseline study was finalized in July 2013 and will be on-line ([www.scalingupnutrition.org](http://www.scalingupnutrition.org)) in September 2013. It was translated in French and Spanish. The French and Spanish versions will be uploaded as well on the website. A retrospective stock-take of the context

for nutrition before the emergence of the SUN Movement was also conducted. The stock-take report will be finalized in September 2013 and made available on the website afterwards.

## 2.2. Monitoring SUN Movement Secretariat Services (outputs)

The SUN Movement Secretariat serves the SUN Movement and delivers support services to the Movement as a whole. These services are considered as outputs and are tracked as routine monitoring data. The **Annex 1** to this report provides details of the activities and outputs monitored for the period 15 December 2012 – 14 June 2013 (as per reporting period for the inception report of the EU grant).

The output monitoring primarily serves the purpose of Secretariat's accountability, through which the Secretariat can demonstrate the extent to which it lives up to its mandate and contractual commitments and its demonstrated ability to learn from experiences. For the output monitoring the logical framework approach with a conventional system of Objectively Verifiable Indicators is used. The indicators that were already developed as part of the logframe of the "foundation document" indicators have been reviewed and streamlined to the extent possible without jeopardising the contractual monitoring obligations of the Secretariat vis-à-vis its donors. The **Annex 1** to this report also provides explanations on revisions made to the details of activities and output indicators of the Logical Framework of the SUN Movement Secretariat.

The **Updated logical framework of the SUN Movement Secretariat (Annex 2** to this report) remains structured along three Result Areas:

- *Result Area 1:* the SUN movement **Lead Group** exercises stewardship over the Movement, sustains the political attention to under-nutrition and increases investments in direct nutrition interventions and nutrition sensitive development,
- *Result Area 2:* Each **SUN Country** is better able to bring together national stakeholders for implementation of effective actions to Scale Up Nutrition, to learn how best to do this from experiences of other SUN countries and to access aligned external support for realizing its objectives
- *Result Area 3:* Stakeholders from self-governing and accountable **SUN Networks** respond to needs of SUN Countries in a timely and effective way and contribution to responsive and aligned assistance to SUN countries.

The **Updated Work-plan of the SUN Movement Secretariat (2013-2015)** is in **Annex 3** to this report. It presents major milestones of the organization of work of the Secretariat without jeopardizing its capacities of adaptation to a rapidly changing Movement.



## 2.3. Reporting timeframe of the SUN Movement Secretariat

Based on the M&E Framework of the SUN Movement, **September 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015 will be looked at as the timeframe/reference point** for the monitoring and reporting of the progress and achievements of the SUN Movement (including the Secretariat).

From October 2012 onwards the SUN Movement Secretariat organised its activities along the logical framework that is updated at the occasion of the present Inception Report (focusing on activities of the SUN Movement Secretariat for the period 15 December 2012 – 14 June 2013 in its Annex 1).

### **Annual Implementation Reports (from 1<sup>st</sup> October year N – 30 September year N+1)**

The Annual Implementation Reports of the SUN Movement Secretariat will be based on the Progress Reports of the SUN Movement which are prepared for consideration by the Movement's Lead Group in September each year. These describe the evolution, achievements of and challenges faced by the Movement. They are based on the SUN Movement's M&E Framework and together are the Monitoring system of the Movement (including the Secretariat).

Based on elements from the Monitoring system of the SUN Movement, Annual Implementation Reports of the Secretariat will be submitted to Donors supporting financially or in-kind the Secretariat and can be delivered as follows:

- **Report on the period '1 October 2012 – 30 September 2013'** to be delivered for November 15, 2013
- **Report on the period '1 October 2013 – 30 September 2014'** to be delivered for November 15, 2014
- **Report on the period '1 October 2014 – 30 September 2015'** to be delivered for November 15, 2015

### **Financial Reports of Expenditures (from 15<sup>th</sup> December year N – 14<sup>th</sup> December year N+1)**

An **Annual Financial Report for each calendar year (15<sup>th</sup> December year N – 14<sup>th</sup> December year N+1)** will be submitted by each June 15 of the following year. The Financial Report will include reference to all donor contributions, total approved budget over the programme period, previous year budget with realized expenditures and provisional expenditures for the coming year. The financial reports will be submitted both in USD and Euro.

A **Final report** will cover the whole implementation period **(15<sup>th</sup> December 2012 – 14<sup>th</sup> December 2015)**. It will include a stock-take of all incomes and expenditures of the Action. It is supposed to be submitted within 6 months after the end of the implementation period, therefore by June 14, 2016.

For the requests of payments of each specific contribution, the SUN Movement Secretariat will follow the specific conditions under each donor agreement.

The chart in **Annex 4** to this report summarises the proposed timeframe of delivery of the different reports.

## 2.4. Plan for visibility of EU and Donors' support to the SUN Movement Secretariat

The **Annex 5** to this report outlines the Communication Strategy of the SUN Movement and the actions envisaged by the SUN Movement Secretariat to ensure visibility of Donors' support to the SUN Movement Secretariat.

The SUN Movement Secretariat will include the use of donor logos and links to their host websites on the Website of the Movement ([www.scalingupnutrition.org](http://www.scalingupnutrition.org)) in line with the visibility requirements of each donor as appropriate and in line with the country-led nature of the SUN Movement.

Where possible and appropriate, the SUN Movement Secretariat will highlight the role that donors are playing to support its work through the inclusion of the following language in materials produced by the Secretariat:

***The SUN Movement Secretariat is supported by the Governments of Canada, France, Ireland, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom and the European Union, together with the Micronutrient Initiative.***

## 2.5. Evaluation

Within its current design, plans for the **mid-term evaluation** and **final evaluation** of the SUN Movement Secretariat are outlined in the "foundation document" as follows:

*A Mid-Term Evaluation (MTE) is scheduled to take place before the end of the second year of the Action. Independent mid-term and final evaluations will be conducted by external consultants contracted by UNDP, on specifically established terms of reference previously agreed with all donors and, as the case may be, other relevant stakeholders. An objective of the MTE will be to provide recommendations on how to sustain the benefits that have taken place during the first two years of the Action, and the MTE will contribute towards developing an exit strategy at the end of year three.*

The SUN Movement Secretariat is encouraging all donors to align behind these plans.

It may be necessary to review the basic design of the Secretariat in relation to the changing needs of the Movement well in advance of 2015 to ensure a smooth transition from current design to any new configuration that better meets the needs of the Movement. The Lead Group will be invited to consider this option at its meeting in September 2013.

One possibility is that the **mid-term evaluation reflects on the future of the SUN Movement and explores possible scenarios for evolution in 2014. Ways to involve all stakeholders of the Movement in the mid-term evaluation will be figured out during the last quarter of 2013.**

## 3. STRUCTURE AND BUDGET OF THE SUN MOVEMENT SECRETARIAT – July 2013

### 3.1. Staffing of the SUN Movement Secretariat

In July 2013, slight complements to **Professional Staff** in the SUN Movement Secretariat are envisaged so that it adapts to the growing size and complexity of the Movement and level of expectations on the Secretariat. The details of the updated staffing plan are as follows:

- **Strategy Advisor:** this position was envisaged in the provisional plan made in 2012. The position has not been recruited yet as the SUN Movement Secretariat had to recruit the other positions and to stabilize its functioning and management first. The recruitment of this D1 level position is envisaged for early 2014 (process for recruitment to take place in second half of 2013). The existing budget line is maintained in the update.
- **Policy Advisors:** the initial plan was to recruit 7 policy advisors.
  - o 1 Advisor to the Lead Group is on board. The position is needed until the end of the period<sup>4</sup>.
  - o 1 Advisor on Advocacy and Communication is on board as planned. In addition, 1 Advisor on Website and Communication has been recruited given the importance of providing an up-to date Website ([www.scalingupnutrition.com](http://www.scalingupnutrition.com)) that is instrumental to the life of the Movement and serves as platform for sharing information from SUN Countries: the position is included in the updated budget. 1 Junior Advisor on options for “Branding” the SUN Movement is being seconded by Unilever to the SUN Movement Secretariat (the secondment is directly managed by Unilever, without transfer of money to the SUN Movement Secretariat, but the responsibility of her work lies with the SUN Coordinator): this position has no impact on the Secretariat budget.
  - o Country Trackers: The initial plan was to recruit 3 country trackers. One of the 3 has been seconded directly by France (without transfer of money to the Secretariat budget) and the 2 others have been recruited by the Secretariat. Given the increasing number of Countries joining the Movement, a fourth Country Tracker will be recruited in 2014. The updated budget of the Secretariat is restricted to funding received and spent for the Secretariat. It therefore indicates the financial requirement for 3 country trackers. The French secondment is not appearing in the budget. In addition, a support officer for the Country trackers will be recruited during the last quarter of 2013 to help maintaining the tracking system.
  - o Network Advisors: 2 Network Advisors have been recruited as planned. In addition, a support officer for the Network Advisors will be recruited during the last quarter of 2013 to help maintaining the monitoring system of the SUN Movement fully updated.
  - o Data Manager: in addition to the initial budget, a data manager has been recruited to maintain and analyse the database of the SUN Movement.
- **Liaison Officer within the Executive Office of the UN Secretary General (EOSG):** the initial plan was that the liaison officer with the OESG working for the Special Representative of the UN Secretary-General for Food Security and Nutrition (SRSG) would dedicate half of her time to the activities of the

SUN Movement Secretariat. Therefore, half of the cost of the full-time position was included in the provisional budget. It appears that the demand on the position is such that almost all of her time is dedicated to SUN Movement Secretariat activities. Therefore 100% of the cost of the position is included in the updated budget.

- **SUN Coordinator:** the initial plan was that the SRSG would dedicate half of his time on SUN related activities. The growth of the Movement has led to growing demand on him. He is now dedicating around 100% of his time to the SUN Movement Secretariat. Therefore the full cost of the full time position is now included in the updated budget. NB: the SUN Coordinator has been paid from other sources (UNSG, HLTF Coordination Team) until end of 2012.

The SUN Movement Secretariat also benefits from the support of the Chief of Staff of the office of the SRSG. This position does not appear in the budget of the SUN Movement Secretariat as it is entirely supported from funds provided for other activities of the SRSG office.

Thanks to effective budget management, the updated budget for professional staff over the period 2013-2015 is lower than the initial plan (minus 17%) despite the growth in size of the professional team of the SUN Movement Secretariat.

Some adaptation of the **Administrative Team** of the SUN Movement Secretariat is also envisaged:

- **Assistants in Geneva:** 2 full-time assistants are based in Geneva according to initial plans. In addition, a part-time assistant has been recruited to assist the SUN Movement Secretariat with travels of the staff and other administrative tasks related to the management of the Geneva office. This is reflected in the updated budget.
- **Assistant in New York:** The initial plan was to recruit a full time assistant in New York especially to assist the financial management of the SUN Movement Secretariat. Given the quality of support provided by UNOPS for financial management of the SUN Movement Secretariat, this position will now be part-time. This change is reflected in the updated budget.
- **Administrator in Geneva:** As per the initial plan, a full time administrator is based in Geneva to handle the administration of donors grants to the SUN Movement Secretariat in close relation with UNOPS and UNDP.
- **Administrator in New York:** As per the initial plan, a full time administrator from UNOPS is supporting the management of the SUN Movement Secretariat. This administrator is supported by one assistant. The cost of this support is in proportion to the overall size of the budget of the SUN Movement Secretariat.
- **Additional Support Staff:** An additional officer for IT management has been recruited to provide daily support to the staff members of the SUN Movement Secretariat and ensure smooth running of the numerous teleconferences which are critical for ensuring daily communication between the SUN Movement Secretariat and a growing number of SUN Countries. In addition, a reporting officer will be recruited in 2014 to support the preparation of the activities and financial reports of the SUN Movement Secretariat. These additions are reflected in the updated budget.

Some of the positions in the Administrative Team of the SUN Movement Secretariat existed previously in the HLTF Coordination Team before the creation of the Secretariat. Until the end of 2012 the costs of

these positions were supported by the budgets related to the other activities of the SRSG (UN System Influenza Coordination, High Level Task Force on Global Food Security).

The growth of the size of the Administrative Team of the SUN Movement Secretariat is reflected in the updated budget for Administrative staff (13% higher than initially planned).

The **Annex 6** to this report provides details of the staffing of the SUN Movement Secretariat as of July 30, 2013.

### 3.2. Operations budget of the SUN Movement Secretariat

The provision for **Advisory Services** (consultancies) has allowed the SUN Movement Secretariat to recruit experts for specific tasks (development of the framework for Monitoring and Evaluation of the SUN Movement, support to the work on Conflict of Interest, support to the development of learning routes for SUN countries, etc.). Given the growing demand for specific support from the SUN Movement Secretariat, the need to be flexible to adapt to the evolution of the Movement and the expected capacities of the Secretariat, the provision for Advisory Services has been slightly increased for the period 2013-2015 (17% higher than initially planned).

A provision for **Travel** is used for missions of the SUN Coordinator and the staff of the SUN Movement Secretariat in countries and their participation in global and regional meetings as required. The provision for travel has therefore been increased in the updated budget (+49%) given the growing demands on the Secretariat (with three professional staff members being home-based and travelling regularly to Geneva).

The budget for **General Operations** is significantly increased in the updated budget 2013 (+124%). It is broken down as follows:

- **External evaluation:** the plans for mid-term evaluation and final evaluation have not been changed. They will be discussed and firmed up with the SUN Lead Group, Countries, Networks and Donors of the SUN Movement Secretariat in the last quarter of 2014.
- **Communication:** the initial budget is slightly revised to reflect more precisely the real costs of communication of the SUN Movement Secretariat. The change is not significant.
- **Printing:** the initial provision is confirmed in the updated budget.
- **Translation:** the provision for translation is substantially increased given the pressing demand from SUN Countries to provide them all the documentation of the SUN Movement Secretariat in French, English and Spanish. Occasional translations in Russian and Arabic are also envisaged. The whole website has been totally translated from English to French and Spanish in 2013. The initial provision only envisaged the translation of major publications of the SUN Movement Secretariat (Annual Progress Report of the SUN Movement). The updated provision will allow the SUN Movement Secretariat to translate all its documentation, including minutes from country calls and working documents and to update the website in English, French and Spanish (and other languages as needed).

- **Equipment & Consumables:** The initial provision allows the coverage of increased costs of equipment of the Secretariat due to additional staff: it is maintained in the updated budget.
- **Rent offices:** The cost of rent of offices in Geneva and New York is shared with the HLTF Coordination Team in 2013: the provisional cost is therefore lower than initially expected. The SUN Movement Secretariat expects to rent more space in Villa la Pelouse in Geneva but not to change location for the duration of the Action. The updated budget for this expenditure is lower than initially provisioned.
- **Website services:** The development and update of the website is supported by GMMB since 2011. This service from GMMB was largely supported by one Donor through a direct grant to GMMB. It appears that the donor now has less capacity to support Website services provided by GMMB. Therefore the SUN Movement Secretariat will need to support the cost of sustaining the website. The revised budget for this expenditure is significantly higher than initially provisioned.
- **Visibility:** the visibility plan has been developed in the first half of 2013 (see **Annex 5** to this report). The budget for this activity is maintained.
- **Special events:** No specific event organised by the SUN Movement Secretariat was planned when the initial version of the budget has been made. During the first half of 2013, it was decided to include a provision for organising yearly special events gathering the stakeholders of the Movement. The specific objectives and design of these special events will be tailored to the needs and requirements of the Movement as it evolves. A provision of €364.031 (*USD 482.800*) per year is added to the revised budget.
- **Miscellaneous direct costs:** The cost of Miscellaneous has been adjusted to take account of updated needs on the basis of real costs in first half of 2013.

The **Annex 7** to this report provides details of the Provisional Budget of the SUN Movement Secretariat as of June 2013, with a yearly breakdown 2013-2015 and a Total compared to the provisional budget made in December 2012 (attached to the “foundation document”). It highlights an increase in provisional budget of 14% reflecting a slight growth in size and capacities of the SUN Movement Secretariat to adapt to evolving needs and expectations. The Updated budget of the Secretariat is approximately 3.8 million euro (*5 million USD*) in 2013, 5 million euro (*6.7 million USD*) in 2014 and 5.6 million euro (*7.4 million USD*) in 2015; i.e. a total of **14.4 million euro (19.1 million USD) for 2013-2015**.

### 3.3. Incomes and gap

Donors have started supporting activities related to the emergence and evolution of the SUN Movement Secretariat since 2011. To pay tribute to all contributions to the activities and evolution of the SUN Movement Secretariat since its early days, the **Annex 8** provides details of the contributions, in cash or in direct secondment, received and committed in support to the SUN Movement Secretariat from 2011 until 2015.

Canada, the European Union, France, Ireland, the Netherlands and United Kingdom have supported the evolution of the SUN Movement Secretariat and are moving towards provision of multi-year financial support with joint planning and reviews.

France is supporting the Secretariat by seconding a senior staff since end of 2012. Unilever intends to support to the Secretariat by seconding a junior staff in 2013. These contributions do not appear in the overall budget as the covered costs are not included in the Budget of the SUN Movement Secretariat.

The Gates Foundation and Germany announced specific contributions for the organization of the 2013 SUN Global Gathering (New York, 23 – 24 September 2013). Micronutrient Initiative made a specific contribution to efforts for the development of a conceptual model for simulating the impact of multi-sectoral approaches to scaling-up nutrition.

The realized Budget of the SUN Movement Secretariat is 467.035 euro in 2011 (619.410 USD) and 1.030.053 euro (1.366.118 USD) in 2012 (see report “2011-2012 Implementation and Financial Report” of the Secretariat<sup>5</sup>). At the beginning of 2013, the Budget SUN Movement Secretariat has a positive balance of about 3.7 million euro (4.7 million USD). The SUN Movement Secretariat believes has to raise **an additional 4.5 million euro (6 million USD)** to cover the estimated Updated Budget 2013-2015<sup>6</sup>.

## ANNEX 1: Activities of the SUN Movement Secretariat.

15 December 2012 – 14 June 2013

**Result 1: The SUN Movement Lead Group is able to exercise stewardship over the Movement, sustain the political attention to under-nutrition and increase investments in direct nutrition interventions and nutrition sensitive development.**

**Activity 1.1.:** Provide assistance to Lead Group so that it can exercise accountable stewardship over the Movement in line with the SUN Movement Strategy and Revised Roadmap

### Operational Activities

- The SUN Movement Secretariat (SMS) organized the 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting of the SUN Lead Group (April 10, 2013)
- SMS organized an informal meeting of the SUN Lead Group (May 10, 2013) [see Activity 1.4]
- SMS prepared an interim report to the Lead Group on the State of the Movement, including its achievements and its challenges, over the period October 2012 to March 2013. This report was presented to the Lead Group at their 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting on April 10, 2013
- SMS maintained regular contacts with SUN Lead Group members (including through bilateral meetings and calls) with the objective of fostering their engagement in support of the SUN Movement
- SMS updated (on a monthly basis) the Lead Group Chair on the progress/challenges of the Movement
- In 2012 SMS worked on an overall SUN Movement Activity Plan which helped the identification of the strategic objectives in the SUN Movement Strategy. This exercise also informed the development of the Monitoring and Evaluation Framework of the whole SUN Movement adopted in April 2013

### Achievements

- The SUN Lead Group met at the 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting (April 10, 2013) and took stock of progress against the 12 actions identified by the Lead Group at their 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting on September 27, 2012. The SUN Lead Group also requested 10 actions to be implemented by the SUN Movement during the next 6 months (April – September 2013), for review by the Lead Group at their September 2013 meeting
- The SUN Lead Group met at an informal meeting on May 10, 2013 and focused on ways in which the Lead group can increase the momentum of the Movement [see Activity 1.4]

### Changes introduced in the implementation (revised Logical Framework)

- Deletion of Activity 1.1.c (*Facilitate the development and dissemination of a manifesto that indicates the contribution of the Lead Group to the SUN Movement (based on the SUN Movement strategy), updated are disseminated twice yearly*) as this activity is no longer considered necessary

### Updated Workplan 2013 – 2015 (Annex 3)



**Activity 1.2.:** Provide assistance to Lead Group Members – and the Movement as a whole - to undertake effective resource mobilization for addressing under- nutrition

### **Operational Activities**

- SMS supported the efforts to mobilize resources for scaling up nutrition in countries and kept Lead Group members informed of these developments through information notes and regular contacts
- SMS encouraged support to countries to reconcile external and internal funding against the national costed plans [see Activity 2.2]
- SMS supported on-going work by the SUN Donor Network to establish a consistent method for tracking financial investments in nutritional outcomes. SMS engaged closely with this process to ensure that the tracking of spending is consistent with the process of costing national nutrition plans [see Activity 2.2] in order to ensure transparency around needs and spending

### **Achievements**

- During the SUN Senior Level Meeting in Brussels on March 14 and 15, 2013 the Donor Network committed to develop a methodology to improve the quality and availability of data on external development assistance aimed at addressing under nutrition. The expected results from this project include a common methodology to assess all nutrition specific and nutrition sensitive external development assistance for donors who report to the OECD-DAC for a baseline year (2010) and one additional year (2011), as well as feasible options to improve nutrition resource tracking over the long term
- The SUN Donor Network is assessing catalytic financing options
- Analysis of the costs of 20 SUN Country Plans is finalized, translated and made available (including on the website) [see Activity 2.2]

### **Changes introduced in the implementation (revised Logical Framework)**

- Deletion of Activity 1.2.c (*Ensure that all advocacy messages and resource mobilisation strategies of the Movement are sensitive to the gender dimensions of nutrition and recognise the importance of women's empowerment for improvements of the nutrition of populations*) as the core of this activity is already reflected under Activity 1.4 on high level advocacy

### **Updated Workplan 2013 – 2015 (Annex 3)**

**Activity 1.3:** Provide assistance to Lead Group Members to oversee the accountability of the overall SUN Movement

### **Operational Activities:**

- SMS recruited an external consultancy company (MDF Training & Consultancy) for the development and establishment of a Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) Framework facilitating the appreciation of progress and effectiveness of the SUN Movement over the next three years (2013-2015)
- With the technical support from the consultancy company, SMS supported and facilitated the development of the SUN Movement's M&E Framework through a process which included extensive consultation with SUN Networks and SUN Countries

- SMS constituted a Reference Group, consisting of representatives of all Networks and Lead Group to support this work
- A two-day design workshop with representatives from SUN Networks was held in Geneva on March 7 and 8, 2013 with the objective of advancing on a shared M&E Framework for the Movement
- With the technical support from the consultancy company, SMS took stock retrospectively of the context for nutrition, in early-2010 before the emergence of the SUN Movement
- With the technical support from the consultancy company, SMS established the baseline situation for the Movement at September 2012 to determine the point of comparison for future monitoring and evaluation, including the independent evaluation of the SUN Movement (including Networks, Lead Group, etc) and Secretariat foreseen in 2015

### **Achievements**

- SUN Movement M&E Framework was approved by the Lead Group (April 10, 2013), uploaded on the website and translated in Spanish and French. The Spanish and French versions will be uploaded as well
- SUN Movement Baseline Report (September 2012) was developed. It will be uploaded on the website in September 2013. It was translated in French and Spanish and the French and Spanish versions will be uploaded as well on the website
- SUN Stock taking Report (prior to September 2012) was developed. It will be finalized and disseminated (uploaded on the website) in September 2013

### **Changes introduced in the implementation (revised Logical Framework)**

- Two new indicators were included to reflect activities related to the Mid-Term and Final Evaluation of the SUN Movement: 1.3. i (*Terms of references for the final evaluation are available*) and 1.3.j (*Mid-term evaluation report is disseminated, as appropriate*)

### **Updated Workplan 2013 – 2015 (Annex 3)**

<b>Activity 1.4:</b> Enable Lead Group members to undertake effective High Level Advocacy
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#### **Operational Activities**

- SMS organized an informal meeting of the Lead Group (May 10, 2013) to encourage Lead Group members to undertake high level advocacy
- SMS prepared key advocacy messages for Lead Group members in occasion of high level event and tailored to the specific context and audience
- In preparing the interim State of the Movement report (October 2012 – March 2013), SMS requested Lead Group members to provide an update on the work they are undertaking in advocating for SUN in their individual and collective spheres of influence

#### **Achievements**

- The SUN Lead Group met at an informal meeting (May 10, 2013) and focused on ways in which the Lead Group can increase the momentum of the Movement through intense and targeted advocacy in relation to high-level nutrition events (including the “International Conference against Child under-nutrition: Saving Lives and Building Nutrition Resilience: which approaches, what financing?” organized by UNICEF and the Government of France in Paris on May 14 and 15, 2013; the High Level event on “Nutrition for Growth” in London on June 8, 2013 hosted by the UK as Chair of the G8, with the Children’s Investment Fund

Foundation (CIFF) and the Government of Brazil; “Sustaining Political Commitments to Scaling Up Nutrition” on June 10, 2013 in Washington DC, hosted by Concern Worldwide and Bread for the World).

- At the Lead Group informal meeting on May 10, 2013, Lead Group members and their representatives agreed to work together: 1) To stimulate highest-level participation in the events; 2) To ensure a strong focus in the meetings on ensuring that commitments lead to results; 3) To encourage a focus on strong systems for monitoring and mutual accountability among stakeholders; 4) To enhance linkages between national and global actions (and actors); 4) To ensure that high-level meetings are a galvanizing influence within national efforts; 5) To encourage inclusivity within the high-level events.
- Lead Group Members were provided by the SMS with key messages for major events including the 2013 World Economic Forum in Davos (January 24, 2013) and the High Level event on “Nutrition for Growth” (June 8, 2013)
- A document was prepared and shared with all Lead Group members at their 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting (April 10, 2013) gathering major contributions from (9) SUN Lead Group members to advocate for the SUN Movement.

### **Changes introduced in the implementation (revised Logical Framework)**

- Deletion of activity 1.4. e (*Identify up to 20 nutrition champions throughout the Movement (10 in 2013): equip them with advocacy materials, empower them to be effective, monitor their achievements, and ensure that they are closely linked to the Lead Group*) as the identification of nutrition champions is taken forward by other actors
- Replacement of indicator 1.4.iii (*Nutrition (and SUN) is referred to within global agendas in ways that identify deliverables, encourage commitments from major stakeholders and indicate accountability for impact*) with a new indicator better reflecting activity 1.4 m (*Brief Lead Group members to help them be effective advocate*)

### **Updated Workplan 2013 – 2015 (Annex 3)**

<b>Activity 1.5 (new):</b> Foster greater understanding of the SUN Movement and its progress
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#### **Operational Activities**

- SMS, with the technical support from GMMB, ensured the development, update and maintenance of the scalingupnutrition.org website
- SMS recruited a consultancy company (Euroscript) for the translation of the website
- SMS identified potential topics for short briefing notes including obesity, adolescent girls and the concept of Nutrition Justice. 5 of these notes are expected to be produced by December 2013.
- SMS produced regular updates to ensure that SUN Movement supporters, who have signed up to receive the update sent by e-mail every month, are informed of the latest developments across the movement and kept abreast of upcoming opportunities and cutting-edge research and evidence
- SMS gathered relevant pieces of information and news through constant relations with SUN Country Focal Points who regularly update the SMS on in-country progress and possible challenges. SUN Networks are as well a key provider of information relevant to the activities of the SUN Movement
- SMS initiated the drafting of the 2013 Progress Report (to be released at the SUN Movement Global Gathering in September 2013)

## Achievements

- First draft of SUN Movement positioning piece (tag-line, “elevator pitch”) is complete and will be finalized by the end of August
- Plan to integrate new messaging in all communications materials in time for SUN Global Gathering in September 2013 is completed
- The new website has been expanded and enriched to include the widest range of information on all SUN Movement stakeholders and countries and re-launched on February 18, 2013
- Website translated into French and Spanish (May 2013); all 41 countries have own sections on website; daily updates posted on developments across the movement and Monthly Newsletter Circulated to over 1,000 supporters of the Movement
- SUN Movement 2 page briefing note, ‘SUN by the Numbers’, PPT and brochure created, continuously updated and available on SUN Website

## Changes introduced in the implementation (revised Logical Framework)

- Activity 1.5 and related indicators were added under Result Area 1 to better reflect current efforts within the SMS to foster greater understanding of the SUN Movement and its progress within and outside the Movement itself

## Updated Workplan 2013 – 2015 (Annex 3)

**Result area 2: Each SUN Country is better able to bring together national stakeholders for implementation of effective actions to Scale Up Nutrition, to learn how best to do this from experiences of other SUN countries and to access aligned external support for realising its objectives.**

**Activity 2.1.:** Support SUN countries to ensure they have timely access to the technical expertise they need

## Operational Activities

- SMS organized **teleconferences** with SUN Government Focal Points (grouped per geographic areas or language: Francophone/Anglophone/Hispanophone/Asian countries) which take place every six weeks and are chaired by the SUN Movement Coordinator. SMS developed minutes and summary notes of the discussion within two weeks after each call. There were translated in French and Spanish and shared with the Focal Points for their comments
- During country calls, SMS engaged SUN Government Focal Points in strategic discussion around priorities such as: 1) Costing and implementation of country plans for improved nutrition; 2) Development or strengthening of M&E systems; 3) Articulation of needs and alignment of in-country support as first line of response. Each country progress and/or specific concerns or requests was captured at the end of each country call
- SMS worked with the SUN Government Focal Points as they track progress and made country information regularly available through **Country Progress Update Tables** which track progress by SUN Countries around *four processes indicators* (outlined in the SUN Movement Strategy)<sup>7</sup>. These Country Progress Updates were updated during country calls

<sup>7</sup> As outlined in the SUN Movement Strategy, when they join the SUN Movement, Governments in SUN Countries and their partners – both in-country and internationally – agree to take forward *four processes* that contribute to nutritional outcomes. They are: 1) Bringing people into a shared space for action (multi-sector, multi-stakeholder platforms); 2) Ensuring the existence of coherent policy and legal framework(s); 3) Aligning efforts and programs around a Common Results Framework; and 4) Ensuring financial tracking and resource mobilization (around a Common Results Framework).

and shared with countries after each call. They also informed conference calls of the SUN Network Facilitators as well as meetings of the Lead Group

- Country Progress Update Tables serve as the basis for **SUN Country Briefs** which summarize information on progress by Countries and which are updated, translated and made available on the website
- 40 (or more) SUN Government Focal Points will be present at the occasion of the SUN Global Gathering in New York (September 23 and 24, 2013). SUN Networks participants will be involved in the meeting as well.
- SMS is working to produce a **Details of Country Progress** as part of the Progress Report of the Movement. The Details of Country Progress gather information on countries organized around the four process indicators (available in the Country Progress Update Tables) and is collated by the SMS and validated by countries

### **Achievements**

- Four teleconferences with up to 40 Country Focal Points took place and minutes and summary notes were produced, translated, made available on the website. Key outcomes of these calls were shared with SUN Networks Facilitators in advance of their six-weekly calls

### **Changes introduced in the implementation (revised Logical Framework)**

- Deletion of Activities 2.1.a, 2.1.b, 2.1.d and 2.1.g and deletion of Indicators 2.1.i and 2.1.ii as to better reflect the evolution of the kind of interaction between the SMS and SUN Countries. For instance the activity related to “*establishing working methods for SUN Government Focal Points and agreeing on Terms of Reference*” was deleted as it is not the SMS responsibility to set the working patterns in countries. The SUN Strategy is setting the strategic objectives and principles of engagement to which SUN Countries and other stakeholders commit to work for and to align to
- 2 new Indicators were added (2.1.d. and 2.1.e) and 1 Indicator was further elaborated (2.1.a) to reflect the relevance of engaging in regular strategic discussions with SUN Country Focal points and its modality (i.e. six weekly interactions and yearly meetings) and related outcomes (i.e. SUN early progress reports made in consultation with SUN Country Focal Points)

### **Updated Workplan 2013 – 2015 (Annex 3)**

<b>Activity 2.2: Track progress in SUN countries</b>
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#### **Operational Activities**

##### **Four processes**

- SMS worked to enable new SUN Countries (11) to report and demonstrate their progress in Scaling Up Nutrition along the four processes (identified in the SUN Strategy). SMS updated Country Progress Update Tables of the other 29 SUN Countries [see also Activity 2.1]
- In order to assure quality, consistency and credibility of joint reports coming from SUN Countries, SMS has initiated a qualitative evaluation of the four processes
- SMS is preparing documentation of best practices for scaling up nutrition along the four processes
- SMS is preparing the 2013 SUN Progress Report with compiled country information on progress along the four SUN processes

##### **Costing**

- SMS with support from external consultants (MQSUN - a consortium of eight non-state

organisations leading the field of nutrition) completed the cost analysis of 20 national plans to estimate the overall costs of implementing concerted efforts for improved nutrition

- SMS provided a standardized definition of Specific Nutrition Actions, Nutrition Sensitive Approaches and Nutrition Governance to inform the analysis of the costed plans and facilitate the discussion among partners in the SUN Movement
- SMS was invited to contribute to the development of the content for the Nutrition for Growth event (London, June 8, 2013) by providing inputs for the estimation of results, costing and financing
- SMS supported the communication and preparation for participating countries in international events with a particular focus on the costs of implementing concerted efforts for improved nutrition

#### **Simulation**

- SMS recruited an external consultancy company (Columbia University) for the development of a conceptual model for simulating the impact of multi-sectoral approaches to scaling-up nutrition

#### **Conflict of Interest**

- SMS supported, with the support of an individual external consultant, the development of an independent consultation process on Conflict of Interest in the SUN Movement

#### **Learning**

- SMS is undertaking a mapping of knowledge gaps, learning interests, and best available practices that can serve for a learning exchange between different SUN countries
- SMS recruited an individual external consultant to undertake a mapping exercise of the knowledge gaps, learning interests, and best available practices that can serve for a learning exchange between different SUN countries. Based on this mapping exercise, the learning needs will be identified as well as the relative costs for a learning package through exchange routes

#### **Regional Resource Centres**

- SMS engaged strategic discussion on possible Regional Resource Centres, especially in Thailand and South Africa and continued exchanges with countries proposing to set up Regional Learning Hubs and with stakeholders that could contribute to sharing experiences and learning
- SMS was invited to contribute to the concept note on Nutrition Resource Hubs for the 'Nutrition for Growth' preG8 meeting held in London on June 8, 2013

### **Achievements**

#### **Four processes**

- Baseline (Country Template) for reporting on progress for the new 11 SUN Countries is finalized and shared

#### **Costing**

- Analysis of the costs of 20 SUN Country Plans is finalized, translated and made available (including on the website) through different products: 1) Summary Report; 2) Two-pager presentation for each country; 3) Power-point presentation
- 15 SUN countries have made their costed nutrition plans publically available. A further 5 National plans are currently under development or being finalized or updated (Bangladesh, Burundi, Kyrgyz Republic, Rwanda, Pakistan). As other countries make their plans available they are shared on the SUN Movement website

#### **Simulation**

- The Columbia University's first paper is submitted. It is a comprehensive literature review of the impact of different sectoral interventions on nutrition



### **Conflict of Interest**

- With the support offered by the SMS, in April 2013 the Gates Foundation approved a project proposal from the Global Social Observatory (GSO), an independent forum for multi-stakeholder dialogue, for a Consultation Process on Conflict of Interest in the SUN Movement. This transparent process will aim to ensure that all stakeholders within the Movement can contribute fully to achieving the Movement's objective of delivering better nutritional outcomes for mothers and children. The project will be undertaken from April 2013 to February 2015. This process is independent of the SUN Movement Secretariat. It has three objectives: (i) a mapping of issues; (ii) agree a guidance note on Conflict of Interest; and (iii) multi-stakeholder shared learning exercises in relation to specific incidences or possible areas of conflict of interest

### **Learning**

- One survey monkey to know more about of best practices for scaling up nutrition was finalized, translated and is planned to be sent to SUN Movement Stakeholders during the first week of July 2013

### **Regional Resource Centres**

- The SUN Movement Coordinator visited Bangkok in February 2013 and India in April 2013 to explore the interest in, and options for setting up a Nutrition Resource Hubs

### **Changes introduced in the implementation (revised Logical Framework)**

- Deletion of Activities 2.2.a, 2.2.d and 2.2.ii and of Indicator of 2.2.ii as they were redundant and beyond direct responsibility of the SMS. Revised Activities better reflect the interaction between the SMS and SUN Countries

### **Updated Workplan 2013 – 2015 (Annex 3)**

<b>Activity 2.3 (new): Empower Stakeholder Advocacy and Communications</b>
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#### **Operational Activities**

- SMS produced a detailed mapping of both the progress and requests for support for Advocacy and Communications from SUN countries
- SMS provided targeted advocacy and communications support to multi-stakeholder platforms (including key message to the Lead Group for the participation at major events – World Economic Forum 2013 and Nutrition for Growth event).
- SMS produced revised TOR for the Scaling Up Nutrition Advocacy and Communication Team (SUN ACT) to reflect agreement taken after the Nutrition for Growth event to include representatives from all Networks. SMS organized calls to each Network Facilitator (last week of June 2013) to secure buy-in and nominations for representation on SUN ACT

#### **Achievements**

- 2-page costing summaries have been produced to support the advocacy efforts of the 16 SUN countries that have participated in the costing exercise. Summaries are also being produced for the additional 4 countries that have recently joined the exercise.
- The first call of the new SUN ACT is planned for mid -July 2013

### **Changes introduced in the implementation (revised Logical Framework)**

- Activity 2.3 and related indicators were added to better reflect current efforts within the SMS to empower stakeholder advocacy and communications

### **Updated Workplan 2013 – 2015 (Annex 3)**

**Result 3: Stakeholders from self-governing and mutually accountable SUN Networks respond to needs of SUN Countries in a timely and effective way and contribute to responsive and aligned assistance to SUN countries.**

**Activity 3.1:** Ensure that the four SUN stakeholder networks provide an optimal service when receiving and responding to requests identified by governments and other stakeholders within SUN countries

### **Operational Activities**

- SMS participated in meetings of individual Networks to encourage ways in which they can respond to country needs in a fully and transparent manner
- SMS organized six-weekly SUN Networks Facilitators' calls which include briefing on Country Networks calls and main conclusions (as background material the SMS circulates the Reports of Country Calls with table of country needs in advance of the call). SMS prepared the minutes of the discussion which were shared with the Network Facilitators and then with the SUN Government Focal Points. They were then translated in French and Spanish and uploaded on the website
- SMS maintained on-going informal contacts with SUN Networks Facilitators on one to one basis including monthly calls (three calls took place as of June 2013)
- SMS participated in all SUN Donor Network calls and meetings including the "Scaling Up Nutrition Senior Officials Meeting" in Brussels on March 14-15, 2013
- SMS participated in SUN Business Network Launch (Dec. 2012) and CSO Network launch (June 2013)
- SMS participated in some SUN UN Network calls
- All SUN Networks Facilitators and other Networks' representatives will be involved at the occasion of the SUN Global Gathering in New York (September 23 and 24, 2013)
- SMS maintained contact with individual Networks to ensure Networks' activities are reflected in the website content

### **Achievements**

- SUN Donor Network has agreed Terms of Reference (Dec. 2012)
- SUN UN Network has agreed Terms of Reference and Workplan (June 2013)
- SUN Business Network Strategic and Operational Plan presented to SUN Business Network Launch (Dec. 2012). Finalisation required.
- SUN CSO network has governance structure (November 2012) and draft strategy (January 2013) in place. Steering group of the SUN CSO Network governance meets regularly every 6 weeks
- Three SUN Network Facilitators' calls took place
- CSO Network approach paper for communication drafted (June 2013) which includes ways to maximize use of the sun website.

### **Changes introduced in the implementation (revised Logical Framework)**

- Deletion of Activities 3.1. f and g and related Indicator on the development of the Task Teams (*Ensure development of the first set of five Task Teams before end of first half of 2013, monitor their work and report to the Networks and Lead Group on their efficacy across the movement, adapt them in the light of changing needs; Ensure full involvement of the Networks in the work of the Task Teams*). The approach is eventually more flexible and ad-hoc with different ways of grouping actors being set up depending on issue and context

## **ANNEX 5: Communication and Visibility Plan 2013 - 2015**

### **Communication of and within the SUN Movement**

The Scaling Up Nutrition Movement is inclusive. Its strength comes from the diversity of its supporters – SUN country governments, donor governments, the United Nations system, business and civil society spanning international non-governmental organisations and local grass roots organizations.

The Movement must be able to coalesce around a common set of messages and a compelling story that each supporter can incorporate into his/her own advocacy which is likely to be further tailored and targeted as needed to respond to the richly varying contexts and audiences captured across the SUN Movement.

Recognizing both the diversity and common needs of supporters of the Movement, the SUN Movement Secretariat has devised this plan to facilitate a clear and coherent understanding of the Movement as well as to support communications and dialogue among all supporters.

#### **Visibility of Donors support to the SUN Movement Secretariat**

*It is one key responsibility of the SUN Movement Secretariat to ensure that all supporters and potential audiences understand the importance of country-ownership and leadership.*

*The SUN Movement Secretariat receives funding from various donors that enables it to execute its coordination and facilitation role. It is very important that the Secretariat is able to acknowledge this funding while at the same time distinguish the support it receives for the functioning of the Secretariat from the various sources of funding and support that is received by all of the 41 SUN countries, the SUN Movement Networks or other actors playing a supportive role to the SUN Movement. The SUN Movement Secretariat has incorporated efforts to promote visibility of donor support with this critical distinction in mind.*

### **SUN Movement Communication Strategy**

The SUN Movement Communication Strategy<sup>8</sup> currently has four overall objectives.

#### **Objective 1: Communicate to advocate**

The SUN Movement is an inclusive effort—open to those that are committed to improving nutrition. The diversity of stakeholders engaged is a core strength of the SUN Movement and offers an opportunity to build a coordinated effort that can contribute to sustainable improvements. As the Movement expands, it is critical that, at the core, there is a shared understanding of what the Movement is. If people don't understand the Movement—they cannot play an effective role in advancing it.

#### **Objective 2: Communicate for learning and engagement**

With information coming in from countries, Networks and others, it is critical to facilitate the connections that are key to advancing progress. This will strengthen engagement and shared learning.

#### **Objective 3: Communicate to empower**

The vast reach of the countries and organizations engaged in the SUN Movement creates a global network with the potential to strengthen efforts and solidify commitments to nutrition. Empowering the different actors within the Movement to advocate for improved nutrition through provision of regular and consistent information exchange contributes to this.

#### **Objective 4: Communicate to amplify**

Channels and mechanisms for disseminating examples of the Movement's progress and success will be built.

## **Target groups**

The Scaling Up Nutrition Movement is inclusive and has a diversity of supporters. All of these supporters have their own priorities for and their own perspectives of what and how action to improve nutrition needs to be taken at local, national, regional and global levels. All supporters of the SUN Movement need to be able to **communicate** the intrinsic value of nutrition to families, communities, economies and nations.

The overall communication strategy therefore has multiple target groups and includes supporters who share the common aim of scaling up nutrition to eliminate malnutrition from all the following categories:

- SUN country governments,
- Donor governments,
- United Nations system,
- Business community,
- Civil society community including international non-governmental organisations and local grass roots organizations.
- General public

## **Communication Specific Objectives of the SUN Movement Secretariat**

The SUN Movement Strategy is translated in the work-plan and log-frame of the SUN Movement Secretariat especially along three specific objectives which relate to all target groups:

### **- Foster greater understanding of the SUN Movement and its progress** (Output 1.5. of the log-frame)

With the broad array of stakeholders involved in scaling up nutrition, the SUN Movement is many things to many people. By creating a common, accessible platform, the Secretariat will help to strengthen the shared understanding of SUN within the Movement and in outreach to external audiences.

### **- Empower stakeholder advocacy and communication** (Output 2.3. of the log-frame)

A wide range of countries, stakeholders and individuals have committed to scaling up nutrition and all have an important role to play in the Movement, though in most cases, they have organizational responsibilities or other commitments outside of SUN. To encourage sustained engagement and action, there are opportunities to make it easy for supporters to share and disseminate information about SUN.

### **- Facilitate Communication, learning and engagement across the Movement** (Output 3.4. of the log-frame)

Supporting an information exchange within and between the SUN Networks will help maximize expertise and learning opportunities across the Movement. Continuous and transparent communication will help to build solidarity. Identifying and documenting success stories/cases from multiple channels can be used to share progress and lessons learned.

Each specific objective is decomposed in Activities presented in the updated log-frame of the SUN Movement Secretariat (see Annex 2 of the Inception Report).

The SUN Movement Secretariat also pays specific attention to needs for advocacy and communication (as part of activities related to output 2.1. "Support SUN Countries to ensure they have timely access to the technical expertise they need" of the log-frame).

The SUN Movement Website ([www.scalingupnutrition.org](http://www.scalingupnutrition.org)) is a core asset of communication for the SUN Movement and will continually be updated and expanded. It is supporting several of the outputs of the SUN Movement Secretariat. The main indicator of the success of the Website ( (e) Number of hits and downloads of documents from website) is presented as indicator of output 3.1.(e) “Ensure effective operation of the SUN Movement website as a tool for advocacy, communications, and coordination among networks and Lead Group members”.

## **Communication Tools**

The SUN Movement Communication Strategy uses a variety of tools to communicate. **All key materials and the website are available in three languages: English, Spanish and French.**

The Communication tools include:

- **SUN Movement website** [www.scalingupnutrition.org](http://www.scalingupnutrition.org). The website is the heart of the SUN Movement communication platform. There has been substantial investment in ensuring that a large amount of up-to-date relevant material is uploaded – particularly to the country pages. There are now over 900 pages in total and the website continues to grow.

### **Visibility on SUN Movement Website**

*The SUN Movement website includes a page that specifically highlights the activities and responsibilities of the SUN Movement Secretariat. <http://scalingupnutrition.org/about/the-global-movement/sun-movement-secretariat>*

*This page provides the most appropriate space in which the SUN Movement Secretariat can highlight the support it receives from donors to carry out its functions.*

*From September 2013, this page will include:*

1. *the logos of the donors supporting the SUN Movement Secretariat (including the European Union) and if required, links to their institutional websites*
2. *the following text:*

*The SUN Movement Secretariat is supported by the Governments of Canada, France, Ireland, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom and the European Union, together with the Micronutrient Initiative.*

- **SUN Progress Report.** An annual progress report is produced in September. Since the inception of the Movement, two progress reports have been produced for 2011 and 2012. The progress reports summarise progress and are accompanied by more detailed country fiches for each SUN country.

### **Visibility on SUN Progress Reports**

*The SUN Progress report will include the following text on the introductory pages of the report:*

*The SUN Movement Secretariat is supported by the Governments of Canada, France, Ireland, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom and the European Union, together with the Micronutrient Initiative.*

*A disclaimer will also be included in Progress Reports. It reads as follows: “The contents of this publication are the sole responsibility of the SUN Movement Secretariat and can in no way be taken to reflect the views of donors and organizations contributing to the SUN Movement Secretariat.”*



- **SUN brochures, PPT presentations and briefs:** The SUN Movement Secretariat produces several publications that are designed to share progress and information about the SUN Movement. These documents will incorporate visibility of donor support – especially the EU - to the SUN Movement Secretariat. These publications include:
  - **SUN Movement Brochure.** The SUN Movement Secretariat has produced a four-page brochure that explains the objectives, principles, approach and progress of the SUN Movement. This is available on the SUN Movement website (in English, French and Spanish) and hard copies will be made available at global, regional and national events.
  - **Powerpoint presentation.** A SUN Movement PowerPoint presentation is continuously updated and can be downloaded from the SUN website for use by supporters in their own awareness raising, communications and advocacy. A slightly shorter version of this PowerPoint has been published (in French, Spanish and English) as a 'booklet' for dissemination at key meetings and events.
  - **SUN briefs.** The SUN Movement Secretariat aims to produce a series of briefings (with a maximum of 8 installments) that will cover relevant SUN-related areas such as analyzing the cost of scaling up nutrition and the Capacity to Deliver initiative. These will be translated into French and Spanish and made available on the website. The SUN Movement Secretariat will also make professionally printed copies of the briefs available for dissemination at global, regional and national events.

**Visibility on SUN brochures, PPT presentations and briefs**

*The web-based and hard-copy versions of these materials include/will include the following text on the bottom of the final page:*

*The SUN Movement Secretariat is supported by the Governments of Canada, France, Ireland, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom and the European Union, together with the Micronutrient Initiative.*

- **SUN Newsletters.** Monthly e-mail updates are sent out to supporters of the SUN Movement every month detailing global and country news.
- **Key messages.** A set of key messages are developed for major nutrition events for members of the SUN Movement including Lead Group members and Country Focal Points. These are sent out by E mail and also made available in paper format.

*The SUN Newsletters and the key messages will not highlight specific donor support.*

**Events and meetings**

Events and global undertakings are utilized as opportunities for communication. Events serve as key rally points for countries and stakeholders involved in the SUN Movement and provide an opportunity to garner external attention for the issue.

Every year, SUN country teams and supporters gather together to acknowledge the growth of the Movement. These global gatherings are an ideal opportunity for communicating progress in scaling up nutrition, learning and sharing experiences. The Global Gathering organized by the SUN Movement Secretariat in September presents an ideal opportunity for disseminating existing communications materials, including those listed above. It is not envisioned that a new set of communications materials will be produced specifically for the event.

## **Human and Financial Resources of the SUN Movement Secretariat dedicated to Communication and Visibility**

Three Policy Advisors of the professional staff of the SUN Movement Secretariat work full-time on Communications for the SUN Movement (1 Advisor on Advocacy and Communication, 1 Advisor on Website and Communication, 1 Junior Advisor on options for “Branding” the SUN Movement).

A large share of the Budget for General Operations covers provision of expenditures related to Communication activities (Communication, Printing, Translation, Website Services).

### **Budget for Visibility**

*A provision of 35.807 euro (47.490 USD) per year (107.422 euro/142.470 USD) for Visibility is included in the budget of General Operations.*

*It will cover the printing and possible shipping (upon requests for specific gatherings) of Communication tools mentioning specifically the Donors’ support to the SUN Movement Secretariat. It is estimated that 1200 Progress Report (estimated cost 15euro/20USD/Progress Report) and 1200 Brochures and leaflets will be printed per year.*
